### About cleft lip and palate

In early pregnancy, different parts of a baby's face develop separately, and then join together. If some parts of the face don't completely join, the baby is born with a cleft.

A cleft lip is one or two notches or gaps in the upper lip. A cleft palate is a gap in the roof of the mouth. A baby can be born with a cleft lip, cleft palate, or both a cleft lip and palate.

Around 1,200 babies are born with a cleft each year in the UK. That's three every day.







### What causes a cleft?

Usually, a cleft is caused by a combination of many different genetic and environmental factors, that can't be predicted or prevented. It's very unlikely a baby's cleft was caused by anything the parents did or didn't do.

#### How is it treated?

Babies born with a cleft are assessed and treated by specialists in NHS Cleft Teams around the UK. They will usually need one or more surgeries to close the gap left by the cleft, and may need further treatment into adulthood. Adults born with a cleft can return to the specialist Cleft Teams at any age, for more help and treatment.
